

2 May. St Athanasius, Bishop of Alexandria, 373. A great teacher of our faith and preserver of Christian orthodoxy

12 May. Dom Gregory Dix, Priest, Monk and Scholar, 1952. To whom the contemporary Church is richly indebted for his liturgical study and insight

19 May. St Dunstan, Archbishop of Canterbury, 988. Formerly an abbot who did much to restore the English monastic tradition

26 May. St Augustine, the first Archbishop of Canterbury, 605.

Some beautiful and inspiring words from the conclusion to the "Revelations of Divine Love" by Julian of Norwich.

"So it was that I learned that love was our Lord's meaning. And I saw for certain, both here and elsewhere, that before ever he made us, God loved us; and that his love has never slackened, nor ever shall. ### \*\*ASCENSION DAY\*\*

#### UPDATE

Writing an update on our churches and the Church's response to the Covid-19 pandemic at present is far from easy. Mid-month we have the hoped-for May 17 3<sup>rd</sup> step on the Government's planned move out of necessary restrictions. However, as we would rightly expect, at the time of writing this is the 'earliest hoped for date' so, with the inevitable caveat that this remains a fluid state and matters may change....

The regulations for our regular worship are extant and there is nothing significant to add to the update in recent magazines or bulk emails apropos the status of our public worship or church activities, these as always may be found at: <u>www.wemcofe.co.uk</u>, and, as always up to date information may be found on the <u>Church of England website</u> and latest updates on guidance are also on our <u>diocesan website</u>. Our Covid-safe procedures are also detailed elsewhere in this magazine.

What is hoped for from 17 May is that weddings may resume with numbers up to 30 attending, funeral numbers remaining at 30. Baptisms are possible, subject clearly to the size of church, with precautions in place re transmission (for instance, quite sensibly, the priest may not take an infant from parent at the point of Baptism). Also and more practically from 17 May it is hoped that PCC APCMs will be able to be held in-person, legally they have to be by 31 May, so should this date slide we shall have to look to on-line annual meetings across the benefice.

Although this applied from 31 March, to thankfully take account of the climax to Holy Week, you will also wish to know from the C of E Website, that:

Following discussions with government we have advice that a service to mark a 'significant date in the Faith calendar' can happen with attendance up to the Covid safe capacity of the building even though it is not a regular weekly or monthly service.

This means that we will be able to celebrate the great Feast of The Ascension of Thursday 13 May (Laus Deo).

There was additional guidance issued on 16 April apropos those who are clinically vulnerable:

Certain groups of people may be at increased risk of severe disease from COVID-19. Government advice is that while shielding is no longer necessary, it is important for clinically extremely vulnerable individuals to continue to keep their number of social interactions low and to reduce the amount of time spent in settings where maintaining social distancing might be difficult.

At all times our common care and concern for safety will continue to be our overriding concern across the benefice, however, what we can do we will.

#### Spring

What a wonderful time of year: the huge increase of daylight hours and a high powerful sun bringing renewed life in all its glory. Nature at its best you might say. It puts a spring in our step and renews our energy both mentally and physically, so relevant this year as we progress with battling the Covid virus and all the restrictions it brings to our daily lives.

After the turbulent weather of the Equinox, April traditionally brings sunshine and showers to spark Mother Earth into action. Interestingly the last few years have brought fewer showers, cooler air and more sunshine; is this climate change or just the random weather patterns of our northern hemisphere temperate climate?

The magic of new tree and hedgerow leaf, new plant and shrub growth and its youthful vigorous progress to colourful flowering heads, where seeds are set to ensure the seasonal cycle, continues on and is good for the soul, as too the sight of new spring lambs gambolling in bright green pasture. But surpassing even those sights is the sound of early morning wild bird song telling us with its wonderfully positive activity that it is great to be alive. An encouragement for us to get out into our gardens, parks and countryside; exercise is good for us too.

Our Christian message also springs into life at this time of year with its renewing of life through the resurrection, an even better reason for joyous celebration, eternal not just seasonal.

# COVID PROTOCOLS TO KEEP US ALL SAFE

As we now gather across the benefice for Sunday worship it is important to stress that the protocols for covid-safety will remain exactly as when we last met, that is:

\*A record is kept of all attenders for track and trace, if you have the app on your mobile phone do use the QR codes provided and prominently displayed

\*Always sanitise hands on entry, after touching anything 'communal' and before Communion

\*Wear your mask whenever attending worship

\*At all times keep to physical distancing - the 2 metre rule

\* As you would expect Communion will remain in 'one kind' and as yet we are not able to sing

\* Follow any other guidance of the church wardens or sidespeople

There is now the caveat that *all must* leave directly after the service and not 'mingle' in church, outside the 'rule of 6' applies as everywhere else [which sadly doesn't mean talking to 5 others and then moving on to talk to another group].

If or when matters change all will be informed as promptly as possible through both our email system and through the parish notices.

Equally should there, though clearly the last thing we would wish, be an increase in the local R number we will have to re-consider our policy apropos public worship.

#### Alcuin of York, Abbot of Tours

Here is a saint for all, and especially primary school teachers, who have a passion to help children learn to read and write.

Alcuin was born near York in about 735. His family were of noble stock, and they sent him to York Cathedral School, which had the best teachers in the land. They soon realised that Alcuin had a genius for learning, and within a few years he had become master of the school himself. Under his guidance, the fame of the school grew, with more pupils and an ever-increasing library.

In 781 Alcuin visited Rome, where he met Charlemagne, then King of the Franks, who persuaded him to move to Aachen and become master of the palace school – in effect his minister of education.

Alcuin did a magnificent job - he went on to establish a primary school in every town and village, and because the teachers were the clergy, he saw to it that their own literacy and education were improved. But Alcuin did much more - he set up scriptoria for the copying and preservation of ancient manuscripts, for which we owe him the survival of many classical authors. He is also credited with inventing cursive script - or as we know it, 'joined-up writing' - as an aid to speedier copying.

Alcuin also revised the Latin liturgy, wrote nine biblical commentaries, revised the Vulgate Bible, and supported the orthodox doctrine of the procession of the Holy Spirit from the Father and the Son.

By 796, Alcuin was over 60 and ready to retire. Charlemagne appointed him Abbot of St Martin's at Tours, and here, in his declining years, he built up a model monastic school as he had done at York and Aachen. He died in May 804, but his influence lives on today, and affects hundreds of millions of us – all of us, in fact, who use joined-up writing!

#### Ascension

To complete Your seamless robe, and so to complete our faith, You ascended through the air into the heavens, before the very eyes of the apostles. In this way You showed that You are Lord of all, and are the fulfilment of all creation. Thus from that moment every human and every living creature should bow at Your name. And, in the eyes of faith, we can see that all creation proclaims Your greatness.

A prayer of Bernard of Clairvaux (1090 – 1153). He was the main inspiration of the Cistercian Order of Monks.

#### The story behind the hymn: 'Alleluia, Alleluia! Give Thanks to the Risen Lord'

Not many university students are able to write Christian songs which become worldwide hits, but Don Emry Fishel managed it with his Alleluia No. 1. 50 years on, it is loved and sung by millions of Christians worldwide.

Fishel wrote it in 1971, while he was a student at the University of Michigan and also music leader of a Roman Catholic charismatic community based in Ann Arbor, Michigan. These were the days of folk songs and guitars, and Alleluia No. 1 fitted the prevailing mood perfectly. Written in E Major, it is ideal for guitar accompaniment.

Mr Fishel became a freelance flautist, flute instructor and composer. He was publications editor for the Word of God and Servant Music for a number of years, and then worked in computers for 25 years. In 2008 he moved to Nashville and returned to music, teaching the flute.

Alleluia No 1 was Fishel's first song, written "rather quickly, in about an hour." It had four verses to begin with, but a fifth verse (which became the third verse) was added later, as he prepared for baptism. As Fishel explained, he wanted the line 'We have been crucified with Christ; now we shall live forever' "to be the centre of the song."

Alleluia No. 1 was first published in the UK in Sound of Living Waters, in 1974.
